

This documentary is a provocative look at a historical event of which few Americans are aware. In 1893, armed troops from the U.S.S. Boston landed at Honolulu in support of a treasonous coup d'etat against the sovereign of the Hawaiian Kingdom, Queen Lili'uokalani. Stylized re-enactments, archival photos and presentations by scholars tell Hawaiian history through Hawaiian eyes. After the film, Honu Nichols will discuss ways US imperialism has shaped the current issues of kanaka maoli. Honu is a queer Kanaka Maoli (Native Hawaiian) kia'i wai (water protector), aloha 'āina, activist, ha'i'ōlelo (orator), organizer/facilitator, and creative raised in Maunalua, on the island of O'ahu.
